** Experts from Friends of the Earth Middle East will introduce participants to the complex geopolitical and environmental issues that surround the region's transboundary environmental resources through an in depth look at the Jordan River Valley and the Auja Spring. Throughout the site visit FoEME will highlight how sustainable management of the region's natural resources can serve as a catalyst towards wider peacemaking efforts and how cooperative management frameworks can be part of a future settlement between Israel and Palestine.

At the study tour of Jerusalem introduces the social and political issues of the city as the heart of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. The tour evoke an honest look into the complex reality in Jerusalem, offering general information about the city and its tangible implications. The tour moves through a series of observation points, located within Israeli and Palestinian neighborhoods in East Jerusalem. The guide supplies background knowledge on the formation of the city borders and other crucial issues about life in the city and its political future: the separation barrier, relations between the city and its Palestinian residents, Israeli construction in East Jerusalem, and more.
